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Welcome Rev'd Marty



Rev. Marty is originally from Toronto and accepted his first assignment in the Diocese of Algoma, followed by positions in the Diocese of Toronto. While there he sat on several Diocesan Boards including Synod Council and Treasury Board.

He joined the Primary Reserves in 2006 and served as the Padre of the Queens York Rangers in Toronto. He accepted a component transfer a year later to the Regular Force Naval Element in Esquimalt British Columbia which began 13 years of service during which he was posted off the coast of Hawaii for naval exercises, in the Gulf of Oman during anti-piracy patrols and off the coasts of South and Central America against the illegal drug trade.

In 2010, Rev'd Marty was attach posted to CANOSCOM and deployed with the CST (Casualty Support Team) to Landstuhl Germany where he served as the Canadian Chaplain to the Landstuhl Regional Medical Centre.

Early in 2011, he assumed duties back here in Canada as ASU (Area Support Unit) Toronto Chaplain in Denison Armouries Downsview and was asked to sit on Chaplaincy Board for the Diocese of Toronto in May 2011.

After serving a second time at the Landstuhl Regional Medical Centre in Landstuhl Germany in the summer of 2013, Rev'd Marty joined the staff of St. Jude's Church in Oakville Ontario as an Honorary Assistant.

Later that same year, Rev'd Marty met his wife, Deanne, at St. Jude's where she also served as the Associate Priest. They were married at St. Jude's in 2015 and they have a one daughter, Charlotte.

After retiring from a military career as a Chaplain in the Canadian Armed Forces, Rev'd Marty served as an Honorary Assistant at St. Bride's Church in Clarkson (Mississauga) ON.

Then with his move to the Diocese of Huron, he provided spiritual leadership to St. Michael and All Angels Church in London. Once that parish had secured a new permanent rector, Rev'd Marty was free to respond to our parish profile. And here he is and we are so blessed that he is!

Rev'd Marty will be half time with St. James' but will always be available to speak or meet with you if the need arises and he is "out of office".



The Rector's Desk





Scripture: James 4:13-15; Psalm 90:10; 12

For many of us, July and August are 'getaway' times. Times to travel, to visit family and friends, to enjoy the warm weather, fellowship, and the great outdoors. It provides us a time to get away from our busy schedules and to rest and renew ourselves.

For others, it is a busy time of work, or planting, or home repairs. For those with seasonal jobs the summer can be out-right hectic. Whichever the case may be, it is easy for us to lose our perspective and get tunnel vision with respect to our priorities.

Our society often makes things worse, providing us with so many obligations, demands and distractions that we are left trying to prioritize our activities and wishing for a 28+ hour day. To help to prioritize the process I thought I would share a story I read a few years back. The source is anonymous:

The older I get, the more I enjoy Saturday mornings. Perhaps it's the quiet solitude that comes with being the first to rise, or maybe it's the unbounded joy of not having to be at work. Either way, the first few hours of a Saturday morning are most enjoyable.

A few weeks ago, what began as a typical Saturday morning turned into one of those lessons that life seems to hand you from time to time.

I was listening to my favorite Saturday program on radio where listeners would call in and share their issues and so on. And besides the host, other callers could also offer their perspective. Someone by the name of Tom made a call and shared how he had to stay away from his family due to the nature of his work but that the job paid him really well and that he was having the time of his life. He was thirty-two years old and his question was what should be his priority – job or family?

Another listener called in, an older-sounding chap with a golden voice. You know the kind, he sounded like he should be in the broadcasting business himself. He offered some advice I would never forget.

"Well, Tom," he said, "it sure sounds like you're busy with your job. They must pay you well but it's a shame you have to be away from home and your family so much. Hard to believe a young fellow should have to work sixty or seventy hours a week to secure his future."

"Let me tell you something that has helped me keep a good perspective on my own priorities," the old man continued. "My theory of a thousand marbles. You see, I sat down one day and did a little arithmetic. The average person lives about 75 years. I know, some live more and some live less but on average, folks live about 75 years.

"Now then, I multiplied 75 times 52 and I came up with 3900 which is the number of Saturdays that the average person has in their entire lifetime. It took me until I was fifty-five-year-old to think about all this in any detail and by that time I had lived through over 2800 Saturdays. I got to thinking that if I lived to be 75, I only had about 1100 of them left to enjoy."

"So I went to a toy store and bought every single marble they had," the old man went on. "I ended up with 1000 marbles. I took them home and put them inside a large clear plastic container next to the radio. Every Saturday since then, I have taken one marble out and thrown it away. I found that by watching the marbles diminish, I focused more on the really important things in life. There is nothing like watching your time here on this earth run out to help get your priorities straight."

"Now let me tell you one last thing before I sign-off with you and take my lovely wife out for breakfast. This morning, I took the very last marble out of the container. I figure if I make it until next Saturday then I have been given a little extra time. And the one thing we can all use is a little more time. I hope you spend more time with your loved ones. Have a good morning!"

You could have heard a pin drop when he finished. Even the show's moderator didn't have anything to say for a few moments. I had planned to do some work that morning, then go to the gym. Instead, I went upstairs and woke my wife up with a kiss. "C'mon honey, I'm taking you and the kids to breakfast."

"What brought this on?" she asked with a smile.

"Oh, nothing special, it's just been a long time since we spent a Saturday together with the kids."

She jumped out of bed in excitement.

"Plus," I said to her, "I need to buy some marbles."

Vision Committee News



As of June 30th, we have officially owned 130 Thames St. S. for one complete year. The excitement continues to build as we anticipate renovations getting started.

On May 1st, Diocesan Council approved our application to the Huron Development Fund as well as a loan from the Diocese's Revolving Loan Fund. Fortunately, the loan has a three year grace period wherein only interest payments will be required. These two sources of revenue will bolster our existing investments and give us the capability to launch the renovation project.

PK Construction recently delivered their construction budget and, while it came in approximately \$500,000 less than the preliminary budget, we continue to review each line item looking for more efficiencies and ultimately additional cost savings.

On May 3rd, following many months of design considerations and revisions, we successfully delivered our Building Permit Application to the Town of Ingersoll. The permit reviewer sited a few issues that needed to be addressed by our team. Progress is being made, and with continued patience we should soon see renovations begin.

ACW News




