Our Costa Rican Commitment

Two years ago after going through a personal crisis, my husband, Andrew and I were looking for a retreat where I could spend a few weeks in solitude to regenerate. We chose the little fishing village of Quepos, in Costa Rica, a country we had come to love since our first trip there in 2007. We went there together and before Andrew left me to my task, we met a young Honduran resident who everyone called Chiki. She decided to take me under her wing to show me the "tico" (native) way of life.

Instead of remaining in the hotel I ended up staying with her two daughters in a two bedroom apartment for three weeks. Gone was any thought of meditation and solitude. Chiki gave up her room and the three girls took the other, no discussion, case closed. As I looked around I saw a small fridge whose door didn't close right, a gas stove top that was not working right and only glass shelves on the walls to put her plates and bowls, the little she had on. There was very little in the fridge and no fruits and vegetables. I noticed they mainly lived on beans and rice, and various flour tortillas and the like.

To survive the 35 degree heat, I went out and purchased a fan for the house, I knew she could make good use of it when I left. Then we went out and I bought groceries for the house, after all, she would take no money and it was the least I could do. We spent the three weeks together as much as possible. Her oldest daughter Ambar,19 was going to be an unwed mother in 9 months; she was getting moral support from the father, but nothing else. The youngest daughter Victoria, 16 was introverted and didn't spend much time at home. It took a while, but after some one on one time we finally bonded. The two girls did not speak English but somehow we communicated enough to form a bond of trust.

I looked around the apartment and quickly realized it was much too small for the three girls and a baby. Chiki had told me her financial situation. On a salary of \$500 a month, she had to pay \$280 for rent, around \$50 for hydro, and \$25 for natural gas. The rest foreverything else required for her and her daughters, sometimes very little food. Groceries in Costa Rica, especially meat, vegetables and fruit and as expensive or more than in Canada. I guess they ship most of the best things overseas, because what they had in the stores was not the quality I'm used to.

Andrew and I decided to help as_much as possible so we partnered with the landlord to build an extra room on the large lanai on their 2nd floor apartment along with some needed furniture and kitchenware. We made a commitment to help this family to a better life and become more self-sufficient.

The last two years have seen us back twice. We have provided for the legal fees and application fees for Chiki and Ambar to become dual citizens of Honduras and Costa Rica so they can work and get some assistance, little as it is.

Most importantly, we became Godparents to a lovely Costa Rican boy named Aidan. Although not a church going family, I encouraged Ambar (the new mother) to go to church for baptism classes and prepare for her son's baptism. I also encourage a religious upbringing for Aidan, and tell them how the Lord has seen me through some very

dark times. I know, somehow, that it is doing well, but the language barrier gets in the way so I am taking Spanish lessons to help in our communication.

Though we have done a lot, it only scratches the surface. They are still living in extreme poverty, and jobs what they are, are very low paying and hard to get. We hope to buy a multi property so we can provide housing and a rental property for them to manage, with our help, and provide themselves with a decent place to live at little or no cost.

Costa Rica hosts many refugees, mainly from Colombia and Nicaragua. As a result of that and illegal immigration, an estimated 10–15% (400,000–600,000) of the Costa Rican population is made up of Nicaraguans. [87][88] Some Nicaraguans migrate for seasonal work opportunities and then return to their country. Costa Rica took in many refugees from a range of other Latin American countries fleeing civil wars and dictatorships during the 1970s and 1980s, notably from Chile and Argentina, as well as people from El Salvador who fled from guerrillas and government death squads. According to the World Bank, in 2010 about 489,200 immigrants lived in the country, mainly from Nicaragua, Panama, El Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala, and Belize.




